

PLAY CAPTAINS



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Introduction

Coined after the Block Captain and Jr. Block Captain roles, the Play Captain Initiative is a workforce development and civic-engagement initiative with the mission to empower and train teens in leadership, playful learning and facilitation to make the Play Streets, playgrounds and neighborhoods of Philadelphia more playful.







Play Captains and Playstreets: What's the difference?

Playstreets, a project of Parks & Recreation

Each summer, there are upwards of 500 Playstreets in Philadelphia, which, at its core is a free Summer Meal Program, overseen by Parks & Recreation. They serve as a safe place for children to receive two free meals a day during the summer.

- The Playstreets are closed off to cars between 10am-4pm.
- A resident on the block applies to be a Playstreet Supervisor and 70% of residents on the block needs to sign on their approval for the Playstreet.
- Not all the Playstreets are as 'playful' as they could be.



Play Captains and Playstreets: What's the difference?

Play Captains, a project of Fab Youth Philly

- Pays teens above minimum wage at \$9.00. Senior Play Captains (teens with us for two or more years and 18 y/o) can earn \$10.00
- Adult staff (Group Leaders) start at \$15 hour, and supervisors start at \$20;
- Play Captains work in teams of 5, supported by an adult called a Group Leader; and Group Leaders are supported by an adult Supervisor;
- We prioritize hiring teens that live in the neighborhoods they will be working;
- Teens receive a minimum of 30 hours of pre-employment training.
- Adults receive appx. 60-80 hours of pre-employment training.

- A home base (office space) in every neighborhood within .25 miles walking to/from the Playstreets. This is used for the pre-employment training, and for day-to-day meetings, shelter, cooling-off, storage, etc.
- A minimum of two teams (10 teens) are required to run the Initiative.
- Set schedule on the Playstreets, Monday-Thursday (on Friday the teens work ½ day and attend professional development);
- Teams work on clusters of Playstreets 3-4 per .25 miles within a specific neighborhood so teens can rotate throughout the day, spending approximately 45 min per Playstreet;
- Teens and adults wear uniforms/t-shirts to make them identifiable in the neighborhood.
- Data is collected on the Playstreets every day!

While there are lots of ways to measure success this summer at the core, for us that meant:

- NO cases of Covid-19
- NO trips to the hospital, or worse;
- NO ONE got shot (we were honestly most worried about this one).

We had **31 teens working in 4 different neighborhoods**, two of which were new neighborhoods for us.

And we added Play Captain programming at **three playgrounds** in two of those neighborhoods.

The Play Captains were all over the news this summer.

For the last three years, we've kicked off the teens first day of employment with a "Red Carpet Roll Out" where we literally roll out a red carpet and invite residents, funders, supporters, partners, family, etc. to come out and cheer them on as they enter work. We had AMAZING turn out this summer, **nearly 50 people across 4 locations** and one of the at-large Council members came out (more on that later). This summer, we expanded our program into three playgrounds with a grant from the William Penn Foundation. On the first day, a photographer for the Inquirer was in the area and saw them playing and contacted me and came the next day and took some photos. Partnerships are critical to our success

This summer, we partnered with Afterschool Activities Partnership (ASAP), Tree House Books, F.A.T.O.E art bus, Pennsylvania Handball Association, My Yoga with Marty, Coaches Who Care, & The Sierra Show to bring some additional training, programming & resources to the Playstreets & playgrounds. Innovative Solutions Collective, Dornsife Ccnter for Neighborhood Partnerships, New Church Down the Way and West Kensington Ministries provided home-bases for us. Art-Love Charity donated 200 art bags, Book Smiles and Reading Recycled donated over 1000 books combined, which were distributed and also placed in neighborhood 'mini free libraries." Mighty Writers gave us 100 Mighty Activity books to distribute. Asociación Puertorriqueños en Marcha (APM), Friends of Rainbow de Colores Playground and also Friends of Norris Square Park worked with us to bring programming to area playgrounds. And the residents of Mantua, in West Philly supported another summer of Play Captain programming at the park at 37th & Mt. Vernon Streets.

Councilwoman Gym attended the Red Carpet Roll out & also joined the Play Captains out on the Playstreets in West Philly.










Did you know there is a children's book about the Play Captains?


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
